NEWS FLASH FROM THE OLYMPIA KIWANIS GARDEN—The well tank has failed. It needs to be replaced. At the same time there is a small relay switch and a filter that need to be replaced. According to the contract between Kiwanis of Olympia and Suzanne Stratton (property owner) Kiwanis is responsible for 100% of the capital improvements and repair of the well system. That includes the tank and other parts. The Kincy Water Systems, Inc. have been taking care of the water system for some time and have given an estimate of \$900 for the repair. The Olympia Kiwanis Foundation Board will vote on this at the June 16th meeting.

BOARD NOTES:

President Bill Moore called the Board Meetings for the Olympia Kiwanis Club and the Olympia Kiwanis Foundation to order at 12:05 p.m. on June 3, 2008, at the Community Youth Services office 3rd floor conference room. Board Members present were Jan Britt, Wayne Gruen, Terry Kirkpatrick, Carol Lien, Don Powell, and Kathy Thompson. Club Guests present were: Derek Valley, Barbara Miklos, and Ken Mitchell.

1. AGENDA. The agenda for the meeting was reviewed and amended.
2. MINUTES: The minutes of the Board meeting for May 6, 2008, as published in the Kiwanis Korner were reviewed.

MOTION: Kathy Thompson moved, Wayne Gruen seconded, approval of the minutes as published in the Kiwanis Korner. Motion passed.

3. TREASURER'S REPORT. Don Powell presented the treasurer's report for review. Discussion followed. To stay "in the black" financially, we may want to only provide \$6,000 in community service grand this year.

MOTION: Wayne Gruen moved, Kathy Thompson seconded, approval of the treasurer's report for May, 2008. Motion passed.

4. PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

- Bill will be meeting with a CYS representative about starting a BUG (Bringing Up Grades) program for grade schools and a Terrific Kids Program for Middle School. He will need 2 volunteers from the club – preferably new members – to lead these efforts.
- Recruitment is working fairly well, but we still need to continue our recruitment efforts to get new members and KEEP new members. The Membership Committee will be holding a "New Members Class" shortly, as well as finalize an updated club flyer.
- The by-laws changes proposed at last month's meeting passed at a vote by the general membership on June 1st, 2008.

5. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Membership Committee: Bill Moore presented the following applications for membership:

MOTION: Wayne Gruen moved, Terry Kirkpatrick seconded, approval of Leighton Johnson as a new member. Motion passed.

Community Service: We have collected \$473 so far towards a \$500 size brick for Rotary Point for the still un-named West Bay Park. We want a \$500 brick size – 8" x 16" – so it will be large enough to include the Kiwanis logo and the words *Olympia Kiwanis Club*. Don Powell will check to insure we can get a logo on the brick.

MOTION: Terry Kirkpatrick moved, Wayne Gruen seconded, we purchase a \$500 brick for the Rotary Point Park at the West Bay Park. Additional donations to purchase this brick to be made at club meetings. Motion passed.

Fundraising: Terry Kirkpatrick will be attending a Lakefair meeting tonight (June 3rd). Prices will be set at that time. (NOTE: Roast Beef Sandwich price was set at \$4.50, with \$0.50 charged for Tillamook cheese, \$1.75 for water and \$2.00 for soda pop.)

A food handlers class will be held after our Monday meeting on Monday, July 7th at 1:30 p.m.

Don Lewis will be putting the new awning on the trailer.

Jan Britt volunteered to print up pre-sale tickets for Roast Beef Sandwiches for those members that would like to "buy" a sandwich in advance and/or present as a gift.

Kathy Thompson is cleaning the trailer.

ACTIVITIES

SOKENNA OM (right) is a remarkable story. She seemed to be disconnected and frustrated during most of her high school career, due to personal problems at home. This senior year, she regained a great deal of determination and began working her way back to success. Even though she was over five classes behind, Sokenna began the way back through on line learning. She advocated for herself when she did not have a computer to work on at home. Through patience and persistence, Sokenna was able to secure a school computer that could be used to get on line. Sokenna has been making steady progress every since. In addition, Sokenna hadn't passed parts of the WASL which were needed for graduation. She worked with the OHS intervention specialist, to create an evidence portfolio that required a great deal of extra effort. For these reasons, Sokenna Om has demonstrated great "Achieving by Believing".

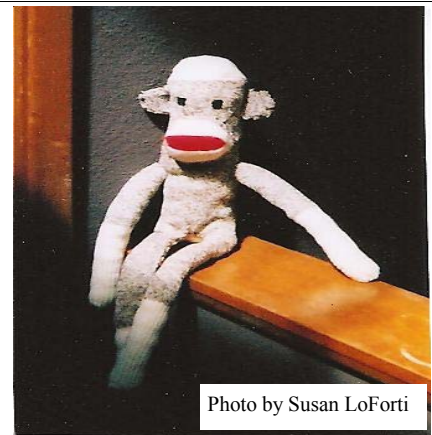
